At one meeting conducted by Postgraduate Medical Education Coordination Committee, Bir Hospital, I had the opportunity to introduce him as the father of Nephrology. Most of our friends in the audience appreciated this designation to Puskar with great applause.

Puskar was not only a very popular physician but also a kind person. He became the Head of the Department of Medicine and Chief of Nephrology Service of Bir Hospital. He became the president of the Society of Internal Medicine of Nepal (SIMON) and also supervised as a preceptor of MD, medicine for a number of years. He was also visiting Professor of Medicine of NAMS.

Puskar will be remembered by his patients and friends for a long time to come. He is survived by two sons and one daughter.
